## REMINDER FOR 2023

**EXHIBITOR HANDBOOK WILL BE AVAILABLE ONLINE ONLY.**

1. Entries in both agriculture and livestock shall be limited to active FFA members in good standing in their local chapter and who are regularly enrolled as students of Vocational Agriculture. Students who graduated last May are eligible to compete in FFA activities and exhibits. New fall students of Agriculture Education are eligible.
2. All prize money will be sent to the local advisor by the Fair Board at the close of the Fair.
3. FFA members will be admitted free to the grounds on Friday, September 8, 2023, if accompanied by instructor. **Free admittance on Friday will be at Gate No. 6 - North Gate to the fairgrounds.**
4. In the event the premiums exceed the budget, the Board reserves the right to pro-rate award money.

# AGRICULTURE DIVISION

1. The FFA exhibits from the local chapters will be allowed expenses of preparing the FFA booth, in which all agriculture exhibits of the various chapters will be exhibited.
2. Exhibitor's tickets will not be given to exhibitors of agriculture products.
3. Each FFA member is limited to one exhibit in each class, and the entry must have been produced on the farm/home operated by him or his parents.
4. Produce will be received from 4:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. on Wednesday, August 30, 2023, at the Harvest Plaza Building No. 8. Exhibits will be released on the Sunday following the fair from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.
5. All sheaves exhibited must measure at least 3 inches in diameter through the middle of the stalk. Sheaves not meeting this measurement will not be given an award.
6. Agriculture exhibits may not be entered in both the FFA and Open Class Division.
7. Preparation of exhibits is listed in Extension Bulletin 406. Contact FFA Superintendent for copies of this publication.
8. Entries limited to 40 exhibits per exhibitor. Quality items only will be accepted. Supervisors and judge will have right to refuse any items that are not of show quality.
9. Prizes will be provided for the Outstanding Produce and Horticulture Exhibitor.

### Class I – 10 hours or less Project – Entry Level Skills

**Premium Class I: 1st-\$8.00; 2nd-\$7.00; 3rd-\$6.00; 4th-ribbon**

#### Requirements:

- Exhibits to be judged together
  - Articles, repaired in some way
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- EXAMPLES: Hammers, axes, sledges, picks, pitchforks
  - Sharpening small tools
  - And other like items and work

### Class II – 10 to 20 hours Project – Entry Level Skills

**Premium Class II: 1st-\$10.00; 2nd-\$8.00; 3rd-\$6.00; 4th-ribbon**

#### Requirements:

- Exhibits to be judged together
- Mounted exhibits of six or more items on a board
- *Suggestions: Sharpening, arc welding on plate, welding on pipe, acetylene welding on mild steel, acetylene bronze work, forge work, electrical work, plumbing board, soldering jobs, etc.*

### Class III – 20 to 40 hours Project – Basic Level Skills

**Premium Class III: 1st-\$12.00; 2nd-\$10.00; 3rd-\$8.00; 4th-ribbon**

#### Requirements:

- Exhibits to be judged together
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- EXAMPLES: Branding iron, Small hand tools, Cold chisel, Halter racks, Hay hooks, Nail box or any other like items

**Class IV – 40 to 60 hours Project – Intermediate Level Skills (3 to 6 skills used)**

**Premium Class IV: 1st-\$15.00; 2nd-\$12.00; 3rd-\$10.00; 4th-ribbon**

Requirements:

- Exhibits to be judged together
- EXAMPLES: Block table, Hay feeder, Jack stands, Show box, Tool box, Divider, Trailer doors, Items made of wood (boxes, benches, saw horses, etc.) or any other like items

**Please Note: Location for Classes V & VI will be in the Equipment Plaza in West Events south of the Light Horse Barn.**

**CLASS V and VI will include a write up of skills used**

**Class V – 60 to 100 hours Project – Advanced Level Skill (6 or more skills used)**

**Premium Class V: 1st-\$30.00; 2nd-\$20.00; 3rd-\$15.00; 4th-ribbon**

Requirements:

- Exhibits to be judged together
- Class V will be in the Equipment Plaza
- Grain feeder, large and complex types
- Small general purpose trailer, 10' long and under
- Stow box, large and complex types
- Stock rack, pick-up size
- Watering trough, complex type and automatic

**Class VI**

**Premium Class VI: 1st-\$40.00; 2nd-\$30.00; 3rd-\$20.00; 4th-ribbon**

Requirements:

- Exhibits to be judged together
- Class VI will be in the Equipment Plaza
- Machine trailer
- Slant Load trailer
- Large machinery trailer
- And other like items
